

Historic Sites of MANITOBA

Lower Fort Garry, 19 miles north of Winnipeg. The only stone fort of the early fur trade intact in Canada. Also the site where No. 1 treaty was made between the Crown and the Chipewyan and Swampy Cree Indians on August 3rd, 1871, whereby those tribes surrendered all their rights to the lands comprised within the boundaries of Manitoba as then existing. (P.T.H. No. 9).

Forts Rouge, Garry and Gibraltar, in the City of Winnipeg. Tablet affixed to the memory of old Fort Garry in the park near the corner of Main and Broadway, to mark the sites of Fort Rouge established in 1738, Fort Garry in 1804, old Fort Garry in 1821 and new Fort Garry, 1836-1839. On the Canadian Pacific Railway Station grounds stands the first railway engine, "The Countess of Dufferin," brought into western Canada. This engine was brought to Winnipeg on a barge down the Red River.

Battle of Seven Oaks, adjacent to Kildonan Park, Winnipeg, in 1816, between the Lord Selkirk Settlers and Hudson's Bay traders on one side and the North West Co. on the other. (P.T.H. No. 1E).

In St. Boniface the Cathedral of the Roman Catholic Church on the site of the first Catholic Church in all the west and on the site on which was erected the Cathedral made famous by John Greenleaf Whittier in his poem "The Red River Voyager" and its reference to "its turrets twain." In the grounds there is a monument to Louis Riel, the leader of the Metis in his lifetime.

Dominion Lands Survey System near Headingly, 15 miles west of Winnipeg. Cairn and tablet mark the site where the first monument on the Dominion Lands Survey was placed on July 10th, 1871. Here was commenced the surveying the basis of land tenure in the Western Province. (P.T.H. No. 1, W).

Fort La Reine. Cairn in Portage la Prairie, to mark the site of the fort built in October, 1816, by La Verendrye, from which he carried on his explorations. (P.T.H. No. 1, W).

Cairn erected in the location of Wawanesa on the banks of the Souris River to commemorate events associated with early fur trading posts and forts built between 1785-1828 from which ran the fur trade routes to the Mandan country and which was headquarters of David Thompson, explorer and geographer from 1797-1798. (P.T.H. No. 2).

The Barrier at St. Norbert Village. Emissaries of William McDougall, appointed first lieutenant-governor, refused entry to Manitoba by Louis Riel and Metis at this point, 1870. (P.T.H. No. 75).

Fort Maurepas at Fort Alexander. On Winnipeg River. Founded by sons of La Verendrye, 1754.

Brandon House, 12 miles southeast of City of Brandon, old Hudson's Bay trading post.

Old North West Fur Company's trading post of Fort Montaigne de la Bousse, 4 miles east of Virden. (P.T.H. No. 1, W).

Cairn in International Peace Garden, dedicated July 14th, 1932. (P.T.H. No. 10).


The Pas, Cairn in Devon Park, in memory of Henry Kelsey, Hudson's Bay Company fur trader and explorer, 1691.

Winnipeg, St. John's Park. Cast stone monument to Thomas Simpson, who, with Peter Warren Dease, in 1837-39, carried out important explorations in the Arctic regions.


In 1802 Alexander Henry Jr., fur trader and explorer, built the North-West Company post called Fort Finlaysonwayning. It is situated 2 miles southwest of Morden on the shores of Lake Minnewanka.

As a tribute to the great explorer, Pierre Gauillier de la Verendrye a boulder cairn was erected during 1948 at the junction of No. 5 Highway and Windygong Road, by the Public Works Department, Highways Branch, in co-operation with The Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada. La Verendrye was the first white man to reach southern Manitoba (1738) in his explorations in search for the "Western Sea."

Fort Dufferin Memorial Cairn. In 1874 the newly organized North-West Mounted Police, now the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, began their westward trek to bring law and order to the western plains. The headquarters from which this move took place was Fort Dufferin near the United States border on the Red River. In commemoration of the 50th anniversary of its connection with the Mounties, a cairn has been erected on the site by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police of Canada. The cairn with its explanatory text is located alongside Highway No. 75 two miles north of the town of Emerson.
