### CITY OF BRANDON

BRANDON, the Wheat City of Manitoba, is the centre of a rich agricultural area. Since the arrival of the first settlers in the 1870's, the city has experienced great growth and today it is a strategic distribution and transportation area. It is also a large shopping and servicing centre, and in recent years its economy has reacted to economic expansion. The Provincial Exhibition and Winter Fair are held in Brandon each year and attract many visitors. Brandon is located at the junction of the Trans-Canada Highway and Highway No. 10 and the strategic position brings to the city a large tourist trade. Several fine vacation resorts are located nearby, and Brandon is the centre of supply for tourists travelling to these areas.

### GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY OF Northern Manitoba

This year the people of Manitoba are celebrating the 50th Anniversary of the Acquisition of Northern Manitoba, and the invitation goes forth to tourists and industrialists to visit Manitoba's Northland — the land of opportunity.

Fifty years ago the boundaries of Manitoba were extended to the 60th parallel of latitude and to the shores of Hudson Bay. The territorial increase (178,000 square miles) included the area north of the 53rd parallel and a small segment to the south. The new province was over three times as large as the old and the new boundaries enclosed 257,000 square miles. The northeastern boundary followed the shoreline of Hudson Bay for 440 miles, and the way was now open to the resources of the great inland sea and to the commerce of the ocean beyond. In addition, the establishment of provincial government on the Bay, led to the development of the old fur trade port, Churchill, as a modern port for ocean vessels. And when the rail line was completed from the Port to Churchill, a link was forged between the seaboard and the agricultural and industrial centres of Western Canada. Thereafter, Churchill grew in importance as a terminal for the export of prairie grain, and as a port of entry for manufactured goods from abroad.

Most of the new area acquired in 1912 lay within the Pre-Cambrian Shield, and the natural resources therein contributed new dimensions to the old agricultural base of the province. The raw materials "North of 53" — base metals, lumber, water power and fisheries — have provided the elements on which new industries have grown. Prosperous towns like The Pas, Flin Flon, Snow Lake, Lynn Lake and Thompson, the new power plant at Kelly, and the one now under construction at Grand Rapids, give striking evidence that the potential of the north is being brought to fruition in an area, where for over 250 years, fur alone was King.

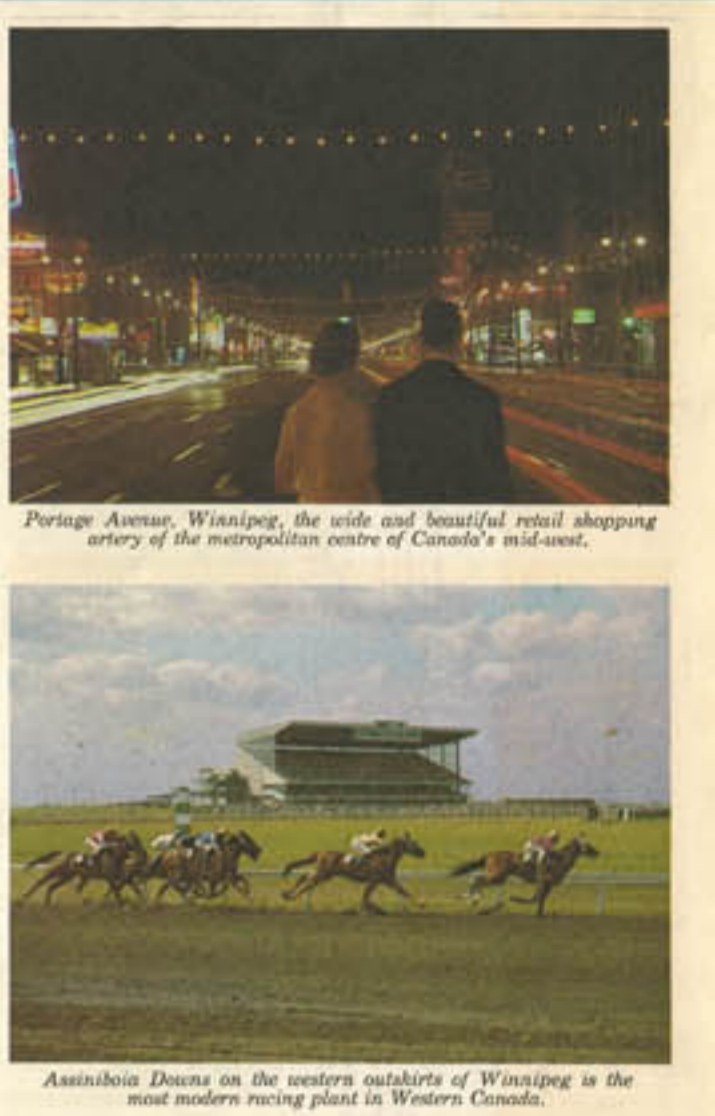
The new area also brought within the confines of the province, opportunities for sport fishing and for family vacations. Many camps, grounds, hunting and fishing lodges and motels have been established close to major highways and rail lines. Others have been built in more remote places and are accessible only by boat or foot-paths.

Northern Manitoba has been host to an increasing number of visitors in each passing year, and this Golden Anniversary year of 1962 provides a special incentive to "Go Down North" and enjoy a relaxing and exhilarating vacation.

**ROAD AND STREET SIGNS**

On Manitoba's highways, traffic signs and markers are similar to those in other parts of Canada and the United States. The provincial speed limits are reasonable — 30 m.p.h. in cities, 60 m.p.h. on highways by day, 50 m.p.h. at night. Careful driving and strict observance of road regulations will help prevent accidents.

The United States and Canadian gasoline measures are not the same. The Canadian gallon is based on the imperial quart, which is one-half larger than the United States quart. Five gallons Canadian equals six United States gallons. It would be well to remember this when you want your tanks filled.
